Year Ten visit the Holocaust Centre


Kindness: eight letters and two syllables, the word really just does rolls off the tongue, something that sounds so simple, but what does it really mean?

The International Chemistry Quiz is an annual competition in which 100,000+ students from 21 countries across the globe participate. The quiz consists of 30 problem-solving style questions that are designed to challenge students. This activity aims to promote interest in chemistry and the role of chemists in our society through an exciting and stimulating challenge.

This year, Penleigh and Essendon Grammar School had 87 Year Eleven and Twelve students participate in the quiz, with 50 students achieving within the top 25% of the state. 25 of these students achieved within the top 10% and were presented with a certificate of 'High Distinction' by Mr Tim Watson and Ms Kate Dullard.

The Chemistry department would like to thank all students for their participation in this voluntary quiz and congratulate them on their fantastic achievements! We look forward to seeing what problems they can solve with innovative solutions as future chemists in our global society.

Term Four truly captures the essence of living life to its fullest by embracing new experiences with a growth mindset. In Year Nine students spend a day at the Cathedral Ranges experiencing a 25m abseil from the top of Mount Sugarloaf, and rock climb on a natural rock face. In Year Eight we offer a 'challenge by choice' on the high ropes course to provide a 'low entry, high ceiling' activity.

Activities are designed in the camp curriculum to challenge parameters of personal growth. Students develop resilience and a crucial understanding each individual approaches and processes a similar experience. The development of new skills and knowledge is then debriefed to allow students to connect these experiences with the wider world.

Term Four sees Year Three students begin their camp journey at Eildon. While there is a shift in curriculum, the critical element of offering new experiences to these students remains as powerful. These activities include a Welcome to Country with Aunty Jo, sharing cabins with friends and exploring the site.

We are proud that our students immersed themselves in Outdoor Education experiences in 2023, and we appreciate the energy that they bring to Eildon Camp. Each year we look forward to providing the canvas in which our students grow, develop, and engage in the outdoors.

Transition in the Early Years

Effective transition processes are essential in every year of school as they ensure continuity of learning, and allow students to begin their next phase of education in a position of optimal preparedness. The first year of school, in particular, involves a significant change in independence and expectations. As early as September each year, kindergartens turn their focus to school readiness and work with our Prep teams to begin the process of transition.

Families are invited to share their insights of their children during their visit to the school, and many questions are asked and answered as we explore the Prep classrooms and the wider grounds. Transition Development Learning Statements are delivered to the school, and these statements give voice to the child, educator and parent. The educator of every enrolled student is contacted to ensure a conversation about the student's interests and what sort of support each student might need. These conversations are valuable in helping us match students with teachers and new friends.

There are many transition activities, however, the highlight of the process is our two Prep Orientation sessions which bring the students together on their new campus. They are always a scene of colour, movement, music, stories, laughter and a wide-eyed appreciation of what is to come. Our staff remain focused on making sure all students leave these sessions secure in the notion that they will be well cared for and supported, new friends will be made, and learning will be fun.

Junior Mathematics Successes

2023 has been both a very busy and a highly successful year for our Mathematics students at both Junior School campuses.

Maths Games Days, organised by the Mathematical Association of Victoria and run by host schools, resulted in strong results at each year level with a first place in Year Five, and a first and second place in Year Six.

The Maths Talent Quest generated a large number of creative and ingenious investigations produced by students from Years Two to Six. After state judging, 18 of these went on to be awarded Distinctions, 23 received High Distinctions with one project by Anastasia Kasapis (Year Six) received the Jim Trotter's Award for Mathematical Excellence in Years Five and Six. A further two projects by Sarah McGinley (Year Two) and Henry Marques (Year Four) were selected to represent Victoria in the National Maths Talent Quest and won National Prizes.

The Australian Mathematics Competition, conducted by The Australian Mathematics Trust, saw 226 of our most able young mathematicians from Years Three to Six compete against the best and brightest in the state. Of those who competed, 99 of our students were awarded Credits, 76 Distinctions, 15 High Distinctions and a prize to Dilan Wickramasinghe (Year Six) for a perfect score.

The Australasian Problem Solving Mathematical Olympiad contest, conducted by The University of NSW, ran over four months and presented our Junior School teams with both challenge and competition. Seven of our students achieved a perfect score and our teams were placed in the top 10% in the country.

We would like to congratulate all of our students on these remarkable achievements.

Building our capacity in Melbourne CBD

At Year Eight we spend much of the year grappling with two key developmental questions: Who am I? and Where do I fit in? Whilst these questions immediately bring to mind social groupings and changing hairstyles, they also promote wondering about capacity, resilience and the wish to function independently without really knowing how.

Our annual City Experience brings much of this together. Students are placed in groups of around 10 students, many of whom they have not worked with before. They work together across three weeks to devise, plan and prepare for a tour of Melbourne CBD, on which they are expected to lead their mentor teacher. Students choose from a pre-set list of themes (fashion, architecture, history etc...) and must consider timing, transport, budgets and other logistical questions.

Every group has a unique adventure ranging from National Gallery explorations to Chinatown dumpling feasts to escape rooms and laser tag. Following the excursion, groups create a short video presentation and a screening is held. Students are always amazed at the breadth of activities other groups have engaged in and speak with pride about overcoming conflict, troubleshooting last minute obstacles and enjoying the fruits of their labours on the day.

All of our students have experienced something truly transformative – to focus on any one experience would do them a disservice. As one student noted at the end of the day, "I thought City Experience would be fun because we could hang out with our friends in the city. I actually found getting to know new people and making choices beforehand to be the best bit!"

Millie Nardella


17 December 2007 – 29 August 2023

Bike Education

One important aspect of growing independence is developing cycling skills to safely navigate bike paths and roads. Year Five students have been excited to participate in a Bike Education Course in Term 4 to support this goal.

The course enhanced students' awareness of road and path safety. This includes wearing the right safety gear, obeying traffic rules, using hand signals to communicate intentions, and recognising potential hazards. These skills lay a strong foundation for a lifetime of safe cycling. The course also introduced students to simple bike mechanics which can help prevent accidents and keep cycles in tip-top condition. They learned how to check tyre pressure, oil the chain, and ensure brakes are working properly

Students practised skills to assist them to confidently handle various situations experienced on suburban roads, bike paths and trails; adapting their riding style, following road signs, and to be aware of the unique challenges each setting presents.

The Bike Education Course is an investment in the students' future cycling. We hope they will be safer cyclists and also develop a love for physical activity and recognise the sustainable mode of transportation that cycling can offer.

STEM Education in Year Four

This term, Year Four delved deeper into STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) education with exciting experiments, incursions and fervent discussions about the world we live in. As Zoe Li aptly put it, "There are so many things in everyday life that I didn't realise included forces".

Using paper aeroplanes and parachutes, students investigated the non-contact forces of air resistance and gravity. Parachutes cascaded from the library steps, while classmates timed their aerial descent. Following their observations, students were encouraged to evaluate their designs and improve upon their original prototypes. While conducting these investigations, students honed their skills in hypothesising, measuring, and drawing conclusions.

To culminate the term, students undertook a STEM project: designing a vehicle with a 3D-printed number plate. During the design process, students embarked on a continuous cycle of experimentation, embracing the valuable lessons embedded in failure and building resilience through trial and error. The resulting vehicles were proudly raced at the annual Wacky Races event which showcased their creativity and ingenuity.

Enhancing the curriculum, incursions enriched students' science literacy and sharpened their 21st-century skills, such as critical thinking and collaboration. The 'Mad About Science' incursion introduced them to timeless simple machines. With DIY catapults and giant levers, they grasped the historical significance of these tools.

Meanwhile, the 'Dream City' incursion offered a STEN activity rotation. They programmed robots using Sphero Edu, navigated virtual realms, and underwent sport science drills to assess agility and strength. This immersive experience highlighted the realworld application of technologies, broadening their understanding of potential career paths.

Preparing for a Career in Medicine?

At PEGS we get by with a little help from our friends!

With over 3500 students applying for 234 Victorian undergraduate medicine places each year the PEGS Careers Team know that competition to gain a place is intense. Successful students must achieve a high ATAR, excellent University Clinical Aptitude Test (UCAT) scores and make a great impression in the Multiple Mini Interviews (MMI). Luckily, each year we have wonderful alumni studying medicine who volunteer their time to support the Career Team and our current students as they undergo the rigorous process and prepare for the UCAT and the MMI.

In early March, students from the Class of 2022, Quinton Nguyen, Ruchi Bath-Samarakoon, Gitaanjali Nair and Alexander Sarossy presented on their preparation strategies and tips for sitting the UCAT and in late November ran an excellent MMI workshop. The Multiple Mini Interview (MMI) is designed to assess communication skills, specifically verbal and nonverbal skills that cannot be measured by standardised exams or transcripts. The team took the students through what to expect on the day and encouraged them to prepare by researching issues in health, reflecting on their own experiences and motivations for studying medicine. The students were exposed to a mock MMI gaining insight and feedback on scenarios and possible questions. It was great to see them honing their ability to articulate their critical and reflective thinking processes and gaining valuable feedback. We are so lucky to have the help of our friends at PEGS.

Investigating Defence Science Careers

On the final day of Term 3 a group of passionate Year Eleven science students travelled with the careers team to Fishermans Bend; one of many research bases of Australia's Defence Science and Technology Group (DSTG). The mission of DSTG is: to "safeguard Australia by delivering valued scientific advice and innovative solutions for Defence and national security." We spent the day exploring the base, seeing innovative technologies and participating in interactive activities.

First thing on our schedule was a chemistry activity simulating the analysis of "ricin" in a sample of sand from the beach, demonstrating one of the key tasks of the DSTG Chemistry Department. Competing against each other, we used a mass spectrometer to see whose sample obtained the highest peak, with the winner receiving an intensity of over 9000. We then toured a wind tunnel that was completed in 1941, which copies the actions of objects in flight in order to improve the aerodynamics of fighter jets, missiles, and submarines. The nearby QinetiQ Lab was also fascinating - equipped with large-scale manufacturing equipment and engineers that design and build mechanical solutions for various sectors of the DSTG.

Finally, the instructors reminded us about the importance of communication as we attempted to defuse bombs in VR, while our teammates relayed the instructions verbally to solve the puzzles.

The experience allowed us to gain insight into the work done by these scientists and engineers everyday and to learn about different career pathways within the umbrella of STEM that benefit us all.

Ducklings

The Year Two cohort at Junior School (boys) has been investigating the lifecycles of different organisms in the General Studies unit 'Watch it Grow'. The highlight of this unit of study has been the introduction of ducklings into the classrooms. Each student has had the opportunity to observe a lifecycle stage change in real time and learn in a hands-on way, how to care for living things. Students have been tracking the weight of the ducklings and graphing their growth, as well as budgeting costings for raising ducklings if they were to raise them at home. A highpoint for all the students was watching their ducklings take to water and swim for the first time. Comparisons of the lifecycle of a duck have been made to the lifecycles of different organisms and similarities and differences have been discussed. Students were amazed that a duckling can swim after four or five days, yet it takes a human two years to learn how to walk.




Memories of Kaylene Humphry by Kerrin McCrum, Director of Library Services

Kaylene Humphry started work at PEGS in 2006. She was an experienced and professional Library Technician who had worked in school libraries in Warrnambool and Heidelberg and the public library in Williamstown. She had special expertise in audio visual and computer technology. At PEGS she had dual responsibilities between the Library, where she managed all the audio visual equipment, recording and dissemination of programs and the Information Technology section, where she managed all the school photocopiers, computer audits and technology repairs.

Kaylene was exceptionally competent and skilled in everything she did. Her organisation, attention to detail, reliability, understanding of libraries and emerging computer technologies, skills in developing work processes and procedures, willingness to learn and to innovate and follow up, completion and evaluation of everything she did, made her an outstanding worker.

French Journey







1953 - 70th Anniversary of Limerock Hall

An account in the Penleigh Magazine 1953 shows that Penleigh Presbyterian Girls' School students were very

Goodness knows how it all happened, but immediately after Christmas there were rumours of terrific activity in Penleigh's eastern school-yard. Earth-removing monsters following hard on the heels of tree-fellers had to make way for a team of colourful Italian trenchers. Then brick walls began to rise at incredible speed ... Finally the roof was on, and hey presto! We had a large gymnasium and two new classrooms! Fathers to the rescue once more, providing all the extras – lights and blackboards, paint

The "gymnasium" is now known as Limerock Hall. It was a single storey building initially with upper classrooms added on later.

Opening of the New Block

gathered to see the new gymnasium and two classrooms officially opened.

Miss Limerock, who has had such close and long association with Penleigh, came to perform the opening ceremony, and when she had untied the ribbons of gold, blue and white, the doors were thrown open and the visitors entered.

After the singing of Psalm 100 and a portion of Psalm 24, the Rev. T. G. Allan proceeded with the dedication of the building. The Rev. R. G. Foyster, Chairman of the Presbyterian Board of Education, and Rev. F. Sadler, Moderator of the Presbytery, also took part. At the conclusion of the service, Rev. Allan and Miss Pearson thanked those who had contributed in any way to the new building. Miss Limerock was presented with a set of teaspoons embossed with the Penleigh crest.

Afterwards visitors had an opportunity of inspecting the new classrooms at the rear of the hall, and everyone present felt that this was another forward step in the progress of the School.

1983 – 40th Anniversary of the PEGS Board of Management

On 24 March 1983 the PEGS Board of Directors held their first meeting. This was the final piece in building the PEGS we know today. In 1969 the two school councils of Penleigh Presbyterian Ladies' College and Essendon Grammar School integrated and began to Stevens, instead of functioning as separate entities. When the school finally officially amalgamated in 1977 it became known as Penleigh and Essendon Grammar School and was governed by the PEGS Council.

2003 - 20th Anniversary

Persistence and perseverance - these were the key messages The Age's sports editor and PEGS Class of 1994 member Chloe Saltau imparted to the PEGS class of 2023 at their Valedictory dinner held recently at the Melbourne Showgrounds. The nearly 1,000 guests on hand at the lavish, state-of-the-art Victoria Pavilion listened on in awe as Chloe told of her rise from a 21 year old cadet to The Age's chief cricket writer for over a decade before becoming the paper's very first female sports editor.

From being ignored by cricket great MS Dhoni to being eyeballed by AFL legend Mick Malthouse, Chloe's capacity to embrace change despite not always being ready for it, a curious mind and ability to think outside the box saw her succeed in an area for too long dominated by her male counterparts. Her drive and determination saw her cover some of sport's greatest contests including Commonwealth and Olympic Games, cricket World Cups and one of sport's oldest rivalries – the Ashes series between Australia and England.

Today Chloe's love for her role is only matched by her passion for mentoring young journalists, especially females looking to break into the business, and she continues to advocate for women being represented equally in sport and the media and being paid equally for it.

James Lavender (PEGS 1979) was recently crowned the Australian Senior Amateur Champion for 2023. After three days of competition in Western Australia, James prevailed by a slim margin at Lake Karrinyup Country Club, marking a successful defence having also claimed the 2022 title.



Learning and thinking

Strategic objectives

- Set high expectations for all to promote intellectual engagement, complex problem solving, growth and self-awareness
- Use evidence-based strategies that drive academic and personal success
- Challenge every student to apply new knowledge through deep learning
- Use rigorous assessment practices and feedback to improve teaching and learning
- Cultivate tenacity, courage and drive

New initiatives/developments in 2023:

Learning and thinking are at the core of what we do, driving much of what we offer to our community. High expectations coupled with high support lead to student development. Our staff actively contribute to our learning community and play a crucial role in fostering a Culture of Thinking at PEGS.

Research points to the link between teacher development and student learning. Therefore, we provide opportunities for teachers to learn with and from each other, thereby building collective efficacy A focus on evidence-based strategies continues to shape staff professional learning. In 2023, there has been a range of school-wide, sectional and smaller group foci. Under the guidance of Bron Ryrie-Jones, teachers have concentrated on responsive teaching. This has been supported by ICT and e-learning, in providing better access to data to shape teaching and learning programmes via a new data dashboard. Emina McLean has guided staff in their approach to research in the Science of Reading. Teachers working with Terri Campbell have had a focus on improving student literacy and using feedback as a

Standardised testing data has been used to tailor support programmes for students. In addition, support

tool to drive ongoing growth.

for Middle School students has been offered via Numeracy Plus and Language Plus. A review of results after one year of targeted intervention through Numeracy Plus reveals gains in mainstream mathematics for students involved in this subject. MYAT testing of all Year Seven 2024 students has taken place to enable planning for interventions from the beginning of the school year.

The Middle School Thinking and Learning Committee established three subcommittees:

- Assessment and Feedback
- Curriculum
- Classroom Culture and Pedagogy

Each subcommittee is researching the current evidence base and creating best practice statements in their area. The subcommittees will continue to meet throughout 2024 to discuss our alignment with best practice in each area.

At Larkin Centre, full implementation of Communities of Practice has taken place. This programme encourages teaching staff to engage in professional conversations about best practice teaching and learning. Eight groups were created based on 'best practice' research from AERO and in December, findings from these groups were presented to colleagues.

Further to this, teachers at Larkin Centre have implemented a research-based observation framework, Quality Teaching Rounds (QTR), to support effective reflection on teaching practice. The QTR group involved four staff that have completed training and a full set of rounds. A further QTR group has been established involving middle and senior school staff.

A peer observation system has been introduced for Music Staff. Instrumental teachers have observed a classroom lesson; an ensemble lesson; an instrumental lesson of the same family; and an instrumental lesson of another family, to build collective efficacy through evidence-based professional conversations.

At Kindergartens, staff have utilised the Inquiry Club to exchange readings, ideas and professional experiences, encouraging conversations around pedagogy. Kindergarten Staff were also recognised for their contribution to the Reggio Emilia International Conference held in Melbourne this year.

At all sections of the School, the energy teaching staff are devoting to developing their practice is testament to their commitment to supporting student learning and development through an evidence-based approach.





Care and wellbeing

Strategic objectives

- Foster of a culture of individual and community care
- · Identify and develop initiatives to support the wellbeing needs of students and staff.
- Demonstrate our commitment to equality, diversity and inclusion

New initiatives/developments in 2023:

The School continues to strengthen its culture of care and wellbeing. The appointment of school nurses has provided improvements not only in the consistency of care that is offered at times of illness or injury, but also in the opportunity to review our practices at a system level. An example of this is the new Passtab system used to support record-keeping and the administering of first aid. In addition, automated absence notifications have been introduced this year to provide parents and caregivers with more timely information regarding student absences.

The School ensures that staff are given adequate training and support to be able to maintain a safe environment. Senior staff and OHS committee members have also had training and briefings around the new Workplace Health and Safety legislation, particularly regarding psychosocial hazards. In addition, an updated sexual harassment policy has been developed in line with employers' positive duty to recognise sexual harassment in the workplace, and all staff have completed a sexual harassment training module.

Our Health Administrator has supported staff in wellbeing roles by delivering Mental Health First Aid Training. There has been ongoing work to strengthen our commitment to inclusion and diversity. Kindergarten teachers' participation

in REAIE The Inclusive Community broadened their understanding of inclusion and responsiveness to both individual and group needs

The Reconciliation Action Plan group continues to make progress. Key actions for 2023 included: Having an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander presence on our RAP Committee; inviting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander People to work with our staff and students: cultural competence training for staff; where appropriate, commencing significant events with a Welcome to Country; regularly conducting an Acknowledgement of Country at meetings and events; celebrating National Reconciliation Week; flying Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander flags; broad staff engagement with the RAP; celebrating the progress of our RAP; taking action against racism; through current affairs and formal curriculum, teaching about Reconciliation and planting an Indigenous Garden at Junior School (girls).

Various student programmes were delivered to support care and wellbeing. Examples of where this occurred include drug and alcohol education for Years Ten, Eleven and Twelve students, education about vaping through Middle School form programmes, and cyber safety incursions at Junior School. Victoria Police have also supported the school by delivering education sessions to students at

various year levels.
To support parents and caregivers in managing issues related to care and wellbeing, the PEGSpace parent resource pages were established. These pages include resources on safety and screentime, mental health, relationships, managing grief.

In the cocurricular programme, work continues on practices to support care and wellbeing. A major development in 2023 was the introduction of Clipboard, an app to support all aspects of the programme. This app is being used to manage, schedule and monitor our summer sport season. As well as managing teams and fixturing training and games, it provides improvements to first aid reporting. Performing Arts will be using Clipboard for their summer Dance season and productions during 2024. The Music Department started a trial in Term Four to explore how Clipboard can be used to help with their scheduling of cocurricular lessons, concerts and recitals and other music management.

As well as the introduction of the App, other improvements to health and safety procedures include the development of documents such as Theatrical Hair and Make-up Guidelines, Drama Theatre front-of-house procedures, and Victoria Police Guide to Imitation Firearms (Theatrical Use), which improve child safety and reduce risk.

Engagementand connections

Strategic objectives

- Promote an environment of mutual respect
- · Collaborate and share our story within and beyond the school community
- Build positive and productive relationships with parents and caregivers and alumni
- Promote a culture of open communication and feedback

New initiatives/developments in 2023:

The School has continued to develop opportunities for parents and caregivers to connect with school programmes, and for students to engage with the wider community.

A major project initiated and completed in 2023 was the development and release of the PEGSpace app. The app aims to make communication with parents, caregivers and other members of the community faster and easier to access. It also provides simpler options for payments, student information and absence notifications.

In the Kindergartens and Junior Schools, parent presentation days have been well-attended and allowed students to showcase their learning. Students have used the PEGS Podcast to share their stories with the wider community. Five episodes were released in 2023.

At Larkin Centre, Give Back
Week included the promotion of
a number of key voluntary groups
and encouraged students to be
more actively engaged in the
community. The Social Justice
group has expanded its focus and
promoted a range of charities.
Students have engaged with Elders
from Indigenous communities via

Wurundjeri education sessions, and through Welcome to Country and Smoking Ceremonies led by Wurundjeri and Taungurung Elders at our Melbourne and Eildon campuses respectively.

An International Women's Day afternoon tea took place, supported the McAuley Foundation. The afternoon tea was well attended by parents, staff and students and featured alumni women in science.

The introduction of a formal student leadership system at Larkin Centre, including School Captains and a Student Executive was announced in 2023 for implementation in 2024. Over 70 students applied for leadership roles, submitting an expression of interest, delivering a speech and for executive roles, completing an interview with senior staff. Student leadership roles were announced in Term Four.

The Year 9 Careers Expo was restructured and connected students with alumni and current parents from a range of fields as they explored careers relevant to their identified strengths.

With the appointment of the Alumni Relations Coordinator in 2023, plans are in place to improve communication and connections to support the development of a more vibrant alumni community.

The School continues to refine its programmes to ensure students are engaged and have opportunities to learn and lead. This was evident when Year Seven interschool debating was introduced for the first time and met with great enthusiasm. Feedback from students, parents and staff has been gathered as part of our commitment to ongoing improvement, with formal surveys being conducted at all sections of the school.





Continuity and sustainability

Strategic objectives

- Embrace environmental, social responsibility and governance (ESG) best practice to ensure our school is sustainable for the future
- Ensure we follow best practice in compliance, and financial and risk management to continue to flourish regardless of external impacts
- · Maintain the recruitment and development of outstanding and diverse staff
- Continuously develop resources and create assets, including ICT and facilities

New initiatives/developments in 2023:

Continuity and sustainability continues to be a critical factor in all decisions made regarding financial, physical and human resources. Our awareness of the impact of decisions, on our immediate community and on the community on a broader scale, informs our considered approach in these matters.

A major step towards maintaining the recruitment and development of outstanding and diverse staff was reaching agreement through the Enterprise Bargaining process, with the Fair Work Commission signing off on the PEGS agreement on 13 January 2023. To follow up on the commitments made during this process, a number of new positions of responsibility being developed and filled across the school. Several new roles, designed to reduce risk and support compliance, include a Risk Officer (whole school) and School Nurses (at Essendon, Moonee Ponds and Keilor East campuses).

Another key step taken, was the development of an Employee Value Proposition. This process involved surveys, interview and focus groups, and the outcomes give the school insight into why employees apply for positions at the school, why they stay, and also the factors that may prompt them to leave.

A Napier Street property was renovated and converted for use by the Friends of PEGS, Former Students Association and Business Network, and Archives. The properties at 74-78 Fletcher Street, have been demolished and a new playground constructed on this site.

Works on the former Social Club at the Keilor East campus were completed and the Wellbeing Centre is now in full use. Students attending Eildon Camp enjoyed the use of new bathrooms, following renovations.

Other projects have included the upgrade of interactive screens in Gottliebsen House, and the Limerock Hall projector. Attention has been paid to sustainability, both in terms of larger-scale construction projects, and day-to-day practices. Work has commenced on the installation of electric car charging stations in the McNab House car park, which will be powered by the solar panels on the gym. Hardware is to be installed in January 2024.

Food waste bins at Keilor East. have been installed as part of a plan to reduce landfill and use the food waste to either feed livestock or compost. More lights have been changed to LED and 78 Solar panels were installed on the social club roof as part of the renovation project in January 2023. 25 extra recycling bins have been added at Keilor East to reduce landfill. The school also purchased additional water rights to the Maribyrnong River to offset our water usage at Keilor Park. This water is also

recycled into our water holding tank on site. Our relationship with Cranbourne Botanical Gardens has continued, with new garden beds being installed at the Moonee Ponds campus in Raising Rarity programme

The school has also taken steps to reduce its environmental footprint by reviewing printing and printers/ copiers in the school. The school is moving to reduce paper-based processes, and a full transition to online enrolment processes was completed in 2023. Invoices and receipts are now available for viewing via PEGSpace. Payment via PEGSpace with payments being reflected instantaneously in fee accounts.

As a risk mitigation strategy, the School undertook a project this year to migrate all Single Sign On (SSO) systems to Azure Active Directory. This has allowed the school to protect all our applications with Microsoft Defender and provide greater visibility across our application suite.

All school-owned staff devices now have a cybersecurity agent installed to improve data security. Phishing training and campaigns have been conducted. The School has reworked its financial plan in 2023 to ensure that the school remains in a strong financial position going forward. This was particularly prudent given the impact of the new Payroll Tax that has been imposed.
